# A NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT

*"When so many corners of the world are in fact on the brink of collapse or war or catastrophe, may we live and study and work together this year as a flourishing community . . . on the brink of a better tomorrow."*

I still believe that statement which I wrote to our Board of Directors in September 2019. However, what I thought then and what I thought as we ended the academic year reflect quite different perspectives of the world we actually live in.

"On the Brink of Everything" was the theme for the 2019-2020 academic year. LCC **hosted a discussion on Syrian refugees** with testimonies from Syrians living in Lithuania as well as LCC students from Syria. <b>Human Trafficking Awareness Club Fashion Show</b>	LCC hosted a fashion show organized by the Human Trafficking Awareness Club. All the clothes presented were purchased in local thrift shops to help communicate how fashion can also contribute to a socially conscious and sustainable lifestyle.
<b>TED-Style Event</b>	The LCC Student Council partnered with visiting Fulbright professor Rob Bethke to present <i>On The Brink</i> , a TED-style event where students presented talks on issues important to them, including civil dialogue, consumerism, online community, human trafficking, and conceptions of beauty.
<b>Wheelchair Basketball Game</b>	In order to generate discussions and create support for people with disabilities, a wheelchair basketball game was organized by a proactive group of LCC students called <i>Story In My Eyes</i> , the LCC Moose basketball team, and the wheelchair basketball team, Atrama, from Vilnius.

LCC hosted **Healing Hearts—Transforming Minds Workshop** organized by our Theology Department. The workshop was designed to address the damage of ethnic conflict from all sides. Attendees had an opportunity to practice a Christian approach to conflict resolution.

Attendees included child psychologists, social workers, foster and adoption case workers, and current/prospective adoptive/foster parents from as far as India to participate.

**Student Support**

Knowing that many of our students lost their summer employment opportunities, we offered students stranded in Klaipeda the opportunity to live in our residence halls for the summer, while up to 40 of them also supported our summer camps.

---

**Creative Student Recruitment**

With no ability to travel to other countries for recruitment purposes, we seamlessly moved to a “webinar” format – which has been very successful.

---

**Loan Fund**

We established an emergency loan fund (see the Douglas J. McQuaig Loan Fund below), which is available to students for tuition support in the fall. The concepts of loans and debt are rather new to this part of the world, so we are offering generous forgiveness plans for prompt repayment.

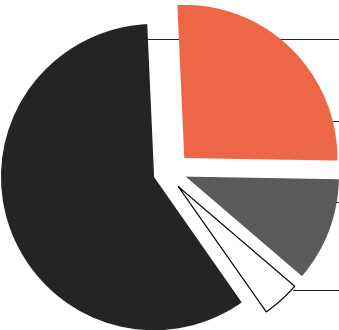
LCC Class of 2019 (the December graduation)

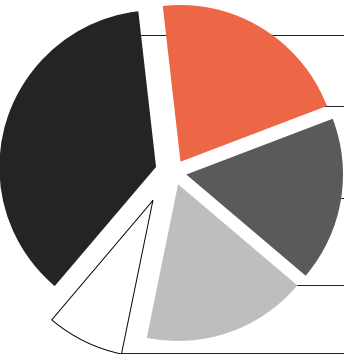

Operating deficit was due to a drop in summer tuition revenue and facility rentals from the second half of the fiscal year, related to the pandemic.

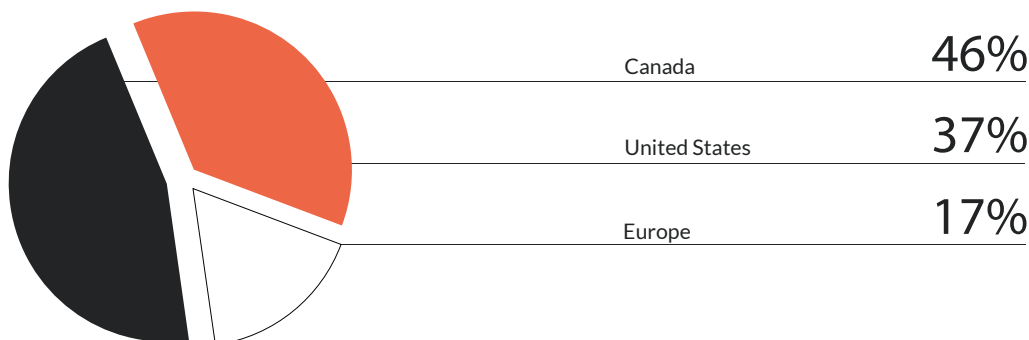
# ANNUAL FUND

The main purpose of the Annual Fund is to sustain the operations of the university and to ensure the funds to offer scholarships and high quality education to students who otherwise would not be able to afford it. Many students find it very hard to pay the full yearly tuition of 4,000 USD, plus living expenses. Our goal each year is to attract funds to the Annual Fund, evaluate the individual need of each student and provide financial support enabling them to experience the North American style education at LCC. We are grateful for each individual gift which impacts the transformation of future leaders.

# **DOUGLAS J. MCQUAIG**

## **LOAN FUND**

John and Melanie McQuaig donated 100,000 EUR for a newly-established Loan Fund to support LCC students being able to return in the fall. John is honoring his father by naming this Loan Fund after him. Here are John's words:

“

My Dad Douglas J. McQuaig was an accounting teacher at Wenatchee Valley College for 25 years. He felt education was the growth opportunity that opened doors for everyone who was able to pursue it. Many people have told me he was the best teacher they ever had. He never rested until every student understood what he was teaching. He also was instrumental in the career choices of many people through his conversations with students. It wasn't always accounting but he helped students identify their gifts and talents and how to pursue them. Late in his career, he was very frustrated with the textbooks that were available. He felt they were designed only for students who wished to pursue a career in accounting as opposed to someone who took an accounting class to learn the basics. He decided he could write a better textbook. He approached several

large publishing houses and Houghton Mifflin decided to publish his book. College Accounting is now in its 13th edition and has been a best-selling accounting textbook for decades. My dad was also always very concerned about the well-being of his students and established an emergency loan fund at Wenatchee Valley College for students that had a short term need. This loan fund at LCC will serve a similar purpose, helping to bridge the gap for students that have a short term need because of the pandemic, including students who are unable to work and travel this summer to earn their tuition for next year. Hopefully, as it is repaid it will become a semi-permanent loan fund for students in the future. Thanks for letting us be involved in this important work.
