RECOGNIZING FACULTY & STAFF EXCELLENCE


After 14½ years of service, Steve and Christine Van Zanen have retired from LCC, leaving behind a legacy of deep commitment to meaningful relationships with students, colleagues, and alumni. Over the years Steve taught 94 courses to over 1,000 students, led the Theology Department as Chair, and together with Christine hosted countless student and faculty groups in their home.

At the 2025 Commencement, Steve was given the title of Professor Emeritus "in recognition of his outstanding dedication to teaching, scholarship, and Christian service as part of the academic community of LCC."





Dr. Shane Crombie, Associate Professor of Communications, received the 2024–2025 Faculty Service Award for his unwavering support during the Communication program's accreditation process. As Academic Council Chair, he listened closely to both administration and faculty, led with wisdom and calm, and kept lines of communication open. His care, presence, and commitment to both students and colleagues deeply shaped the LCC community this year.



Dr. Andrew Williams, Assistant Professor in International Relations and Development, received the 2024–2025 Faculty Research Excellence Award for his outstanding scholarly work across a range of fields. In 2024, he was first author of an article in Politics and Religion and co-authored an article entitled Pedagogy in a diverse and fractured world. He also launched Philanthropia, LCC's academic journal on philanthropy, while maintaining an active and diverse research agenda. His current work explores the philanthropic sector, Christianity and humanitarianism, intercultural communication, nonprofit studies, and the intellectual history of human rights.

Michael McDougle, Lecturer in International Relations and Development, received the 2024–2025 Faculty Teaching Excellence Award for his innovative, student-centered approach to teaching and mentoring. Students describe his classes as life-changing—shaping their values, building empathy, and encouraging them to see others with dignity and compassion. Through his teaching, Professor McDougle powerfully reflects LCC's vision of education that transforms minds and hearts.

the untouched nature and the thousands locals that truly made students fall in love with Georgia.



In November, the Center hosted an event titled Historical Identities: The Impact of Deportations on Peace. Radvyda Vaišvilaite, Chair of Lithuanian Studies at LCC, joined Gintarė Sargūnaitė, President of the Jurgis Šaulys Fellowship, a member of the February 16th Club, which connects families of the Lithuanian Independence Declaration signatories, historians, and diplomats, to share personal and historical perspectives on Lithuania's deportations, inviting the community to reflect on the past and its role in building peace.

RESILIENCE: UKRAINE'S PATH OF DEFIANCE

In February through the exhibition *RESILIENCE*:

Ukraine's Path of Defiance, LCC embarked on a

reflective journey back to 2014, confronting the deep and lasting impact of war through

art, silence, and music. In a moment when many continue to face hardship and loss, LCC united in prayer, embracing one another with

compassion and strength.

In March, LCC hosted Sacred Bubbles: Art, Faith, and Peace—a one-day creative learning journey that brought together artists, researchers, and peacemakers to explore how these elements intersect in shaping a more peaceful society.

Speakers offered diverse perspectives on peacebuilding through visual art, music, and innovative forms of expression, including digital and personal storytelling. Supported by the Peace and Movement Group, the event inspired reflection, dialogue, and a shared commitment to transformative change.



GLOBAL PERSPECTIVES ON PEACE EDUCATION

In July, Naomi Enns, Director of the Center for Dialogue and Conflict Transformation, presented at the Global Perspectives on Peace Education conference, organized and hosted by the Friedens Institut Freiberg and the Berghof Foundation. Her presentation was titled Peace education in the margins: Methods for building empathy, engagement, and transforming conflict.



INSTITUTE FOR PHILANTHROPY

The Institute for Philanthropy, founded in 2013 and the first of its kind in Lithuania, exists to research and promote the love and service for our neighbors and communities.


LCC is building a research agenda with fellows and partner universities in the multidisciplinary study of the philanthropic sector. LCC also conducts events on campus to promote philanthropic understanding and action among students. This dual emphasis supports LCC's desire to be a flourishing academic community rooted in Christian faith that produces graduates who serve society.

LCC celebrated the launch of Philanthropia: A Humanities Journal on Philanthropy and Civil Society.

Published by the Institute for Philanthropy at LCC, this inaugural issue brought together interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary scholarship that explores the ethical, philosophical, cultural, and historical dimensions of giving, voluntary action, and collective engagement.

This was a proud milestone for the LCC community, marking our contribution to meaningful global conversations around philanthropy and civil society.

Building on that success, the journal released its second issue in Spring 2025.



CENTER FOR RESEARCH IN FAITH AND HUMAN FLOURISHING

In March, Dr. Kirk Lougheed, Director of the Center for Research in Faith and Human Flourishing, presented his newly published book A Relational Theory of the Atonement (2024).

The event, moderated by Dr. Travis Myers, Chair of the Theology Department, sparked engaging discussion on theology, atonement, and human relationships.



In April, the Center for Research in Faith and Human Flourishing hosted a thought-provoking event Decolonizing Peacebuilding Epistemology: Ukrainian Peacebuilder Voices on Lithuanian Crowdfunding for Weapons.

Peacebuilding educator and researcher Giedrė Norman presented insights from conversations with Ukrainian peacebuilders, examining the complex intersection of peace ideals and wartime realities.



In May, the Philanthropy and Human Flourishing Conference, hosted by the Institute for Philanthropy and the Center for Research in Faith and Human Flourishing, brought together scholars from around the world to explore the ethical, philosophical, and practical dimensions of giving.

Over two days, presentations ranged from foundational topics like the moral obligations of philanthropy and effective altruism, to interdisciplinary perspectives on family, faith, and societal impact. The conference fostered a rich dialogue on how philanthropy shapes human flourishing in both personal and collective contexts.



CYCLE 5 **TO SURVIVE** AT LCC

P.L. and his wife Kristen combined their love of cycling with a desire to help those less fortunate by creating Cycle 5 to Survive (C5TS). They set out to use their Time, Talent, and Treasures to raise money and awareness for charities so they can fulfill their purposes of creating cycles of opportunity through sports, education, or business. Over five years, they'll cycle across five continents. supporting five charities and aiming to raise \$500.000 for each.

LCC is excited to be participating with the philanthropic entrepreneurs of CYCLE 5 TO SURVIVE.

In the first week of September, P.L. and Kristen Meinderstma made a special stop at LCC as part of their 2024 Cycle 5 to Survive journey, a 7,900-km bike-packing trip from northern Sweden to Portugal.

For the students, faculty, and staff at LCC, the sight of P.L. and Kristen represented more than just two cyclists reaching the finish line. Their journey symbolized the power of perseverance, the strength of community, and the opportunity to create meaningful change for students in need.

LCC is grateful for Allon and Doris and the many friends and donors around the world.




